HELPING CHICKEN ISSUES WITH HERBS

Submitted by Norman Coulter, Suffield, CT

It is advantageous for the poultry to have a variety of feed during dark winter days. It might be helpful to include cutting pumpkins in half or feeding mature ears of corn. Peanut butter can be spread on the ear of corn and roll the ear of corn in a dried mixture of egg layer ration. Hang the corn up where the birds can reach it and enjoy its goodness. Magels can also be hung up for the poultry to eat. A mangel is pure white inside and very attractive to the chicken. They

are a kind of beet.

I have been doing some research on the use of herbs with my poultry. Here is a chart I have found to be a useful reference. The chart is from the book *50 Do-It-Yourself Projects for Keeping Chickens* by Janet Garman from Timber Creek Farm. So, during these long winter days perhaps readers would enjoy looking through seed catalogs to select and plan out which herbs they would like to grow for their poultry this spring.

Herb Gardens For Chickens

Sage - internal parasites, general health

Oregano - internal parasites, antiseptic/antibiotic

Lavender - calming, repels pests, antiseptic, odor control

Fennel -relaxing, laying stimulant

Comfrey -promotes healing

Nasturtium -antiseptic/antibiotic

Marjoram -egg laying stimulant reproductive health

Parsley -laying stimulant high in nutrients

Mint -laying stimulant, odor control repels flies, as a treat

Basil -immune support, repel pests mucus membrane health

Thyme -respiratory health, antiseptic

Dill -respiratory health, antioxidant

Cilantro -antifungal, antioxidant

LemonGrass -fly repellent (add vanilla!)

Chamomile -calming, general health

Lemon Balm-repels rodents, antibacterial

Bee Balm-aids digestion, respiratory health

Other Beneficial Herbs

Yarrow

Chives

Echinacea

Wild Violet - aids circulation

Garlic - control of internal parasites

Q: Who influenced or mentored you when you first started?

John Wabeck, and Ed Ritz who bred White Leghorns.

Q: What faults do you see in the showroom that bother you when showing?

What's bothering me the most right now is everybody's picking high tails and big tails.



Q: What varieties do you raise?

In Rock bantams I got Columbians, Blacks, Barreds, and Whites. In large Rocks, I have White, Barreds, and Partridge. I also have Light Brahmas in bantam and standard.

Q: Tell us a little about your life outside the hobby.

I used to raise cattle, and by education I'm a certified arborist.

HOW POINTS ARE CALCULATED

Members must be in good standing to accumulate points. Points will be recorded per variety. All birds actually exhibited count towards points, including any that may have been disqualified. Birds entered, but not cooped in at the time of judging, will not be counted in the totals. Points are only earned for wins of Plymouth Rocks over Plymouth Rocks, so no points are earned for wins over other breeds such as Champion & Reserve Champion American & SCCL.

BB: 1 point for every Bantam or Large Fowl Plymouth Rock, respectively, exhibited at National, Regional, District, and State Meets. One half point for Special Meets.

RB: 1 point for every Bantam or Large Fowl Plymouth Rock, respectively, exhibited less one point at National, Regional, District, and State Meets. One half point, less one half point at Special Meets.

BV: 1 point for every Bantam or Large Fowl Plymouth Rock, respectively, exhibited within that variety at National, Regional, District, and State Meets. One half point for Special Meets.

RV: 1 point for every Bantam or Large Fowl Plymouth Rock, respectively, exhibited within that variety less one point at National, Regional, District, and State Meets. One half point, less one half point at Special Meets.

DISPLAY: 1 point for each Best Large Rock and Best Bantam Rock display.

When an exhibitor wins BB or RB, their variety points on the same bird are not counted. For example, if John Smith wins BB on a White Rock, he doesn't receive BV points on the same White Rock because they are included in the BB points. In other words, you can't win double points.

FUN FACT:

POSSIBLE CAUSES OF HATCHING PROBLEMS

Excerpted from *Incubating and Hatching Eggs* by Gregory S. Archer and A. Lee Cartwright, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension. Download the full pamphlet at: alec.unl.edu/documents/cde/2017/livestock-management/incubating-and-hatching-eggs-2017.pdf

Environmental conditions, egg handling and storage, sanitation, genetics, and brood fowl health and nutrition are all important factors when it comes to incubating and hatching eggs. Eggs fail to hatch because they are infertile or because the embryo dies. You can candle eggs during incubation or examine them after the hatch to determine what caused them to fail. All abnormalities should be recorded and analyzed to determine if hatch failure was caused by fertility or environmental problems that can be corrected.

IN THE KITCHEN

UPSIDE-DOWN LEMON MERINGUES

From the Iowa Egg Council, submitted by Dianne Weer

Ingredient

- 4 eggs, separated
- 3 to 4 drops yellow food coloring
- 8 ounces whipped topping
- 2 teaspoons cornstarch
- 2 teaspoons grated lemon zest
- 1/2 cups lemon juice
- 14 ounces sweetened condensed milk
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 1 cups sliced almonds, chopped
- 4 cups crisp rice cereal
- 1 cups white sugar
- 2 squares large graham squares, crushed

Directions:

Preheat oven to 300°F. Grease 10 mini pie pans; set aside.

For crust, separate eggs putting the egg whites in a clean and dry glass or metal bowl and saving the egg yolks for the filling. Beat egg whites until soft peaks form. Gradually add sugar and vanilla while continuing to whip until stiff peaks form. Fold in cereal and 1 cup

almonds. Evenly divide the meringue into the pie pans. Press the meringue evenly around the edges of the pans and across the bottom. Bake for 15 minutes. Turn oven off and leave meringues in warm oven for an additional 15 minutes.

For filling, in medium saucepan combine condensed milk, lemon juice, zest and cornstarch. Blend in egg yolks. Cook

over med-low heat stirring constantly until thickened. Cool pudding by placing the saucepan in a bowl of iced water. Stir pudding until cool being careful not to get any ice water into pudding mixture. When cooled, fold in carton of whipped topping and food coloring until combined completely. Fill crusts with filling.

If desired, garnish with crushed graham crackers and pipe additional whipped topping around the edges of each dessert.
