### **BREEDER PROFILE: JAMIE DUCKWORTH**



### Q: How did you develop an interest in the poultry hobby?

**A:** When I was growing up, my parents would always go to the FCX and bought chicks in the spring. We would get Rhode Island reds and Barred Rocks. They weren't bred to the SOP, but they taught me husbandry skills that are still useful today. Life went on, college, marriage, kids and such and I finally got to the point where I had some time for poultry again. That's when I began searching for a breed and the Barred Rocks won the pick from my childhood memory.

### Q: Where did you get your start in Plymouth Rocks?

**A:** I got my first chicks on a road trip to Joel Gilman, who had Tommy Stanley's flock. I also got some eggs from Tom Wheeler of Illinois and hatched them. I later created two families from those lines and have pretty much kept it like that with an occasional outcross between the two families.

### Q: Who influenced or mentored you when you first started?

**A:** I would have to give that honor to Don Shrider. I was involved with the Buckeye project with the Livestock Breed Conservancy and he came out to observe the flock. After observing the Buckeyes, he said that good rocks like I had were not common and that would be an excellent focus for me. Those words of encouragement were enough for me to eventually focus on them solely.

### Q: What varieties do you raise?

A: At this time, only LF Barred Plymouth Rocks. I have had bantam barred rocks and buckeyes in the past.

### Q: What faults do you see in the showroom that bother you when showing?

**A:** I am focusing on tails, leg color and wing carriage. I have improved the width, combs, head width, rate of growth and body width since I started breeding them in earnest 15 years ago.

### Q: What do you enjoy most about breeding and showing your Rocks?

**A:** I like how they are fairly docile birds and how the barring is very crisp, showing the "ringlet" striping from the barring lining up. They are beautiful birds to me.

### Q: Tell us a little about your life outside the hobby.

**A:** I also have Spanish goats, do pasture management for horses, erect fences, and enjoy car shows with my Mustang friends. I also like to make time for my sons and grandchild.

Hello, my name is Jasmine Gates. I am 16 and live in Cairo Missouri with my dad Brian, mom Peggy, and my little brother Blake, on our family farm. I raise Guernsey dairy cattle, Montadale sheep, Satin and Mini Satin rabbits, and Plymouth Rocks.

My Rock adventure started in 2011, at the age of 5. I had shown exhibition birds for one year and did not like my breed. I found a trio of large Barred Rocks at a local auction and fell in love. Unfortunately, I couldn't get any chicks to hatch. In October of 2012, My dad contacted Mr. Kraig Shafer. We met him in Lebanon, Indiana and picked up a trio of large Barreds to begin my breeding flock. Mr. Shafer also had bantams there for sale, so we brought those home as well. I have added a few birds from Shafe since that day, but my lines all go back to his birds.

While Barreds have always had my heart, I have added large Whites as well. I have received birds from Shafe and Terry Britt. Last year, I added birds from Mike Geis to try to improve some traits.

For eleven years, I have never wanted any breed other than rocks. I love the birds, as well as the people. The Rock national meets are always the shows I look forward to the most. All of the top breeders are there to show and talk Rock. I love how everyone is always willing to share everything, from birds to what they do in their breeding programs. When we are together, the rock group all act like family.

Barred Rocks definitely come with their own challenges to breed, but that is part of the fun! There is no better feeling than getting to champion row with my Barred birds. I have been blessed with many successes with my birds. I have been the top junior exhibitor multiple times with the Rock Club. I had a pullet win Reserve SCCL at the Ohio National once. Best Large Fowl Display by a Jr at the Ohio National. One pullet was on champion row at the APA, rock national in Lodi, California. Another pullet was Reserve American at the APA Annual last fall. But one of my proudest moments was at the Missouri State Poultry show at the Rock National one year. I won Champion Large Fowl and Champion Bantam of the Junior Show, both on Barred pullets. ## **KEEPING POULTRY HEALTHY DURING WINTER**

Winter is coming and it is a difficult transition for our poultry. With this transition comes some common health ailments that we can watch for and try to keep ahead of.

Frostbite is one of the most common ailments. Frostbite usually affects exposed areas of the skin such as the comb, feet, and wattles. Frostbite means that the fluid in the cells becomes so cold that the cells freeze and die. This will cause a change of color and texture. If a chicken gets frostbite, move the bird to a warmer place where it can gradually warm up. Frostbite can be prevented by applying petroleum jelly to the combs and waddles before they roost at night. Coconut oil can also help prevent frostbite. It provides a protective barrier against the cold. Coconut oil can liberally be applied to the combs and waddles on cold nights. It will also help frostbitten areas to heal. Try to keep the coop dry and free of drafts. An old rug placed over the top of the cages will help keep the birds warm. Roosts should be provided to keep the birds off the floor.

Pneumonia is a condition that can affect poultry in cold weather. It is caused by a fungus that grows in moist and warm areas in the facility. Cold weather can weaken the bird's immune system making them more susceptible to pneumonia. It is best to keep the chicken coop dry, clean, and ventilated to prevent pneumonia.

Dehydration can be another winter health concern. It is extremely important to keep the bird's water open. If it gets frozen and unattended, the chicken will eventually stop eating and laying eggs. Dehydration for poultry can be an issue twelve months of the year! Waterers need to be freed up of solids and refilled often.
